To the Honorable Mayor, Members of the Town Council, and Citizens of the Town of Fountain Hills:

State law requires that all general-purpose local governments publish, within six months of the close of each fiscal year, a complete set of financial statements presented in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards by a firm of licensed certified public accountants. Pursuant to that requirement, we hereby issue the comprehensive annual financial report of the Town of Fountain Hills for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2009.

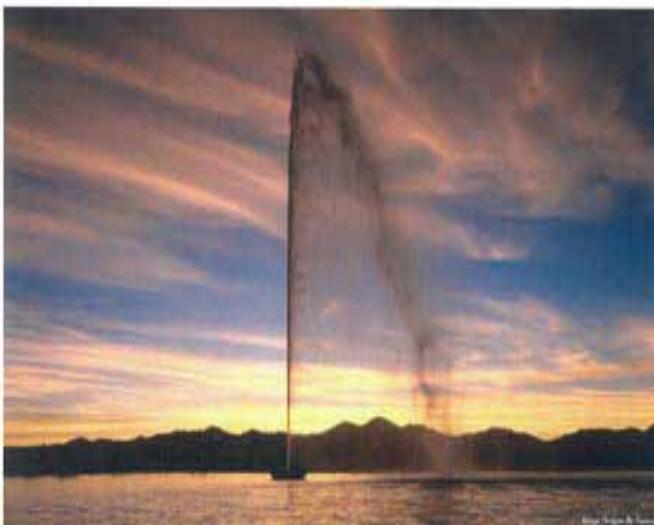
This report consists of management's representations concerning the finances of the Town of Fountain Hills. Consequently, management assumes full responsibility for the completeness and reliability of all of the information presented in this report. To provide a reasonable basis for making these representations, management of the Town of Fountain Hills has established a comprehensive internal control framework that is designed both to protect the government's assets from loss, theft, or misuse and to compile sufficient reliable information for the preparation of the Town of Fountain Hills' financial statements in conformity with GAAP. Because the cost of internal controls should not outweigh their benefits, the Town of Fountain Hills' comprehensive framework of internal controls has been designed to provide reasonable rather than absolute assurance that the financial statements will be free of material misstatement. As management, we assert that, to the best of our knowledge and belief, this financial report is complete and reliable in all material respects.

The Town of Fountain Hills' financial statements have been audited by Heinfeld, Meech & Co., P.C., a firm of licensed certified public accountants. The goal of the independent audit was to provide reasonable assurance that the financial statements of the Town of Fountain Hills for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2009, are free of material misstatement. The independent audit involved examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements; assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management; and evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. The independent auditors concluded, based upon the audit, that there was a reasonable basis for rendering an unqualified opinion that the Town of Fountain Hills' financial statements for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2009, are fairly presented in conformity with GAAP. The independent auditors' report is presented as the first component of the financial section of this report.

The independent audit of the financial statements of the Town of Fountain Hills was part of a broader, federally mandated Single Audit as required by the provisions of the Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996 and U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments and Non-Profit Organizations* designed to meet the special needs of federal grantor agencies. The standards governing Single Audit engagements require the independent auditor to report not only on the fair presentation of the financial statements, but also on the Town of Fountain Hills' internal controls and compliance with legal requirements, with special emphasis on internal controls and legal requirements involving the administration of federal awards. These reports are available in a separately issued Single Audit Reporting Package.

GAAP require that management provide a narrative introduction, overview, and analysis to accompany the basic financial statements in the form of Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A). This letter of transmittal is designed to complement the MD&A and should be read in conjunction with it. The Town of Fountain Hills' MD&A can be found immediately following the report of the independent auditors.

Town of Fountain Hills Profile



The Town of Fountain Hills is a planned, family-oriented community established in 1970 by McCulloch Properties (now MCO Properties, Inc.). Prior to 1970 the area was a cattle ranch and was part of one of the largest land and cattle holdings in Arizona. It was purchased by Robert McCulloch in the late 1960s and designed by Charles Wood, Jr. (designer of Disneyland in southern California). The centerpiece of Fountain Hills is one of the world's tallest man-made fountains, a focal point that attracts thousands of visitors each year.

Located on 13,006 acres of land, and bordering northeast Scottsdale, Fountain Hills is surrounded by the 3,500-foot McDowell Mountains on the west, the Fort McDowell Indian Reservation on the east, the Salt River Indian Reservation on the south and by the McDowell Mountain Regional Park on the north. Elevation is 1,520 feet at the fountain, 3,000 feet on Golden Eagle Boulevard, and is 500 feet above Phoenix.

Over the past eighteen years Fountain Hills has grown from 10,190 residents to a town of approximately 26,000 in 2009. The latest estimates for Fountain Hills indicate that the population will continue to grow to near 34,324 by 2030. On June 5, 2006 the Town of Fountain Hills became two square miles and about ten percent larger by annexing 1,300 acres of State Trust Land. The process to annex the State Trust Land occurred over a two and one-half year period and development of the land will occur over the next decade. Annexing this property into the Town ensures that its future development will be of the highest quality under such Town's standards as the cut-and-fill ordinance and strict zoning regulations. Fountain Hills will have an opportunity to demonstrate that it is truly the best place to live in the Valley.

The Town offers a range of living styles, from small community subdivisions to a number of large custom homes. Fountain Hills also offers recreational, cultural and retirement programs that address the needs and lifestyles of active families and adults. The community consists of primarily residential property; of the total 20.32 square miles of land only 2.58% of the total is zoned commercial and/or industrial, 31% is reserved as open space and the remainder is residential.

The Town's Mission Statement for the Organization

The Town of Fountain Hills' purpose is to serve the best interests of the community by:
providing for its safety and well-being;
respecting its special, small-town character and quality of life;
providing superior public services;
sustaining the public trust through open and responsive government;
and maintaining the stewardship and preservation of its financial and natural resources.

Fountain Hills Town Hall

The Town of Fountain Hills is an Arizona Municipal Corporation, acting as a general law Town as prescribed in the Arizona Revised statutes. The Town was incorporated on December 5, 1989 with the governmental and administrative affairs of the Town operating under the Council-Manager form of government. The Town Council is responsible, among other things, for the adoption of local ordinances, budget adoption, the development of citizen advisory committees and hiring the Town Manager. The Town Manager is responsible for implementation of the policies of the Town Council and administering the Town's operations through five department directors and approximately 82 FTE employees. The Magistrate, Town Attorney and Town Prosecutor are under the direction of the Town Council.

The Town provides or administers a full range of services including public safety (law enforcement, fire, animal control, building inspection); community development (code enforcement, planning, zoning and engineering); the construction and maintenance of streets and infrastructure, municipal court, recreational activities, community center, senior center and cultural events. The Town does not maintain utility or other operations that require the establishment of enterprise funds.



The financial reporting entity (the Town) includes all the funds and account groups of the primary government (i.e., the Town of Fountain Hills as legally defined) as well as all of its component units. The component units consist of legally separate entities for which the primary government is financially accountable. Blended component units, although legally separate entities, are, in substance, part of the primary government's operations and are included as part of the primary government. Accordingly, the Cottonwoods Maintenance District, Eagle Mountain Community Facilities District and Fountain Hills Municipal Property Corporation are included in the financial reports of the Town.

The annual budget serves as the foundation for the Town of Fountain Hills' financial planning and control. The Town Council formally adopts the budget and legally allocates, or appropriates, available monies for the General Fund, Special Revenue Funds, Debt Service Funds, and Capital Projects Fund. Therefore, these funds have appropriated budgets, and budget to actual information is presented. On or before the second meeting in May the Town Manager submits to the Town Council a proposed budget for the fiscal year commencing the following July 1. The budget includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing them. The Town Council is then required to hold public hearings on the proposed budget and to adopt a final budget by no later than June 30, the close of the Town of Fountain Hills' fiscal year. The budget is legally enacted through passage of an ordinance and is prepared by fund and department. The ordinance sets the limit for expenditures during the fiscal year. The Town Manager may authorize transfers from and within personnel and from operating

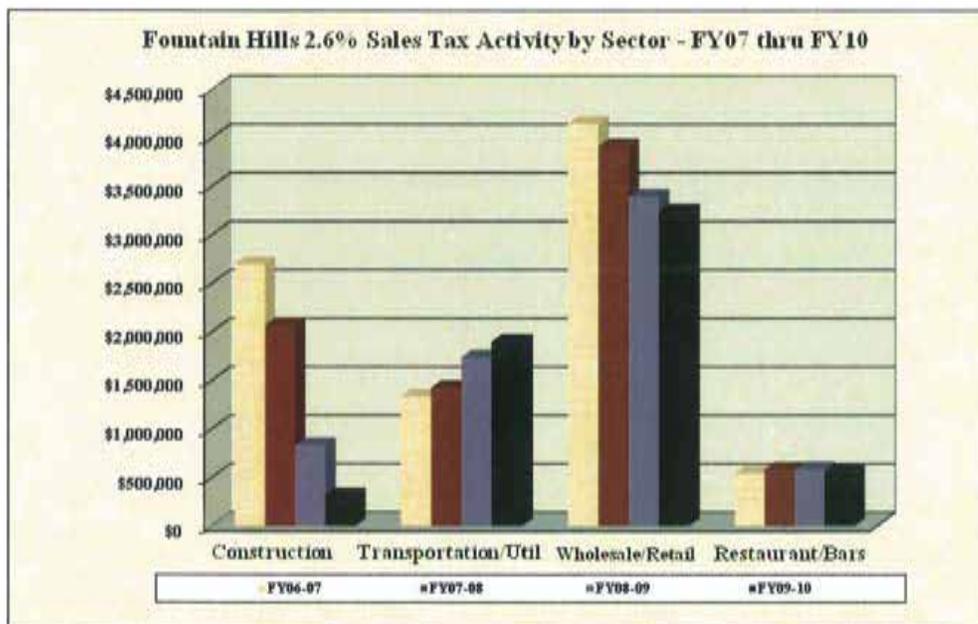
capital to services or supplies within a department. Additional expenditures may be authorized for expenditures directly necessitated by a natural or man-made disaster as prescribed in the State Constitution, Article 9, Section 20.

Factors Affecting Financial Condition

The information presented in the financial statements is perhaps best understood when it is considered from the broader perspective of the specific environment within which the Town of Fountain Hills operates.

Local Economy. The decline in the global economy has impacted the Town's local economy with a sharp decrease in building activity. As such, similar to other Arizona municipalities, the Town is dependent upon state shared revenues and local sales tax as a major source of operating revenue, accounting for 90% of total General Fund revenue for fiscal year 2008-09. State shared revenues are derived as a proportionate share of state sales, income and vehicle license taxes which are distributed based on the Town's population compared to all other incorporated cities and towns in Arizona (currently 0.05%). While State shared income tax revenues increased during fiscal year 2008-09 these revenues are based on two years prior personal and corporate earnings; therefore, it is anticipated that revenues from income tax are projected to decline for the next few years reflecting the economic recession.

The Town of Fountain Hills' local tax revenue base consists of three major tax categories, the most significant being retail sales and construction. The chart below is a look at the past three years' local sales tax activity by sector including a projection for the upcoming fiscal year:



As can be seen in the above chart sales tax collections from construction activity have dropped significantly (50% from fiscal year 2007-08) while transportation/utilities continues to show signs of growth. Retail activity declined in fiscal year 2008-09 due to the closure of a major retailer for over nine months during a complete remodel as well as the economic recession. Fountain Hills is past the historic period of rapid growth and the long-term economic outlook for the Town must recognize this fact. The opportunity to further expand the retail tax base in Fountain Hills is limited by the lack of available commercial land – 75% of the developable lots are already developed.

Development Activity:

A new industrial building located on N. Technology Drive in the Firerock Commerce Center was completed; the building totals 15,078 square feet and is part of multi-building complex. The facility is designed as a “condominium” whereby the building can accommodate a number of businesses with space flexibility to accommodate varying square footage needs.

The Fountain Hills Medical Plaza completed a substantial redevelopment project. The complex includes three shell buildings which total nearly 50,000 square feet (49,082 square feet). The three buildings – Building A being 17,162 square feet, Building B consisting of 11,544 square feet and Building C with 20,376 square feet – are being marketed specifically to the medical industry.

Two office/retail buildings were completed in the Shea Boulevard corridor. The Firerock Plaza multi-tenant buildings are one-story and have added 18,768 square feet to the office/retail inventory.

Technologic Systems, an existing business, built a 13,090 square foot office and warehouse facility on Laser Drive. Technologic Systems has been in Fountain Hills for 15 years and moved from a leased facility into a larger, company owned building in order to accommodate their growing space needs.

Cummings Pest Control constructed a new, 2-story 6,113 square foot office building on Colony Drive.

Plaza Waterfront, a mixed use retail and residential project with below grade parking, completed construction. The project’s first floor consists of office and retail space. The first floor spaces have a combined area of approximately 18,000 square feet. The units are available for individual ownership and have sizes ranging from 540 to 949 square feet. The second story residential condominiums have a maximum livable area of 1,941 square feet and a minimum livable area of 1,528 square feet.

A 2-story retail/office project on La Montana Drive was completed and issued a certificate of occupancy. The 5,235 square foot project houses the Fountain Hills Antiques Center.

A 6,000 square foot retail/office complex located on Parkview Avenue was completed. The commercial condominiums are available for small business locations and expansions.

There were several tenant improvements during the last fiscal year that indicate that Fountain Hills is still a desirable place to locate a business:

Bedmart relocated from Fountain Hills Plaza to El Lago Retail Center into a 2,202 square foot store front. With the necessary improvements made to finish the space and accommodate the move, Bedmart became the anchor tenant in the El Lago Retail Center.

CVS Pharmacy located on Palisades Boulevard added 864 square feet of improved space.

Four businesses located in the Fountain Hills Medical Plaza – a newly completed redevelopment project. Improvements were made to the shell buildings accommodating the new medical businesses.

Spooner & Shaft Physical Therapy – 5,124 square feet

Labcorp Medical Office – 2,432 square feet

Fountain Hills Family Practice – 7,111 square feet

Scottsdale Sight & Dermatology – 2,020 square feet

Sapori D'Italia Restaurant, a new business to Fountain Hills, remodeled an existing building. The 3,120 square foot space includes indoor seating and outside dining options.

Fountain Hills High School built a new 4,500 square feet Learning Center and enhanced a 231 square foot concession stand.

Several business located in the newly constructed Firerock Plaza located on Shea Boulevard. Interior improvements were made to accommodate:

Fountain Hills Massage & Spa – 1,312 square feet

StatClinix Urgent Care – 2,526 square feet

Tenant improvements were made for a dentist office (2,783 square feet) located on Palisades Boulevard.

Raffia, a new retail store, located in Four Peaks Plaza and completed tenant improvements in 1,051 square feet.

Basha's grocery store, located in the Fountain Hills Plaza, held its grand opening after an extensive renovation and expansion project. Basha's, the first grocery store that served the Fountain Hills community in 1974, increased their size by approximately 46% with the 34,040 square foot store being replaced with the state-of-the-art 49,967 square foot store.

Ace Hardware, in the Fountain Hills Plaza, expanded their store to approximately 6,000 square feet.

Long-term Financial Planning. Fountain Hills' financial policies are balanced on sound financial reserves and conservative revenue growth forecasts for the foreseeable future. Potential for State legislative impacts to revenue-sharing or local revenues and additional demands for essential Town services remain. The Town's financial policies set forth guidelines against which current budgetary performance can be measured and proposals for future programs can be evaluated.

Over the past decade the Town of Fountain Hills has embraced a strategic planning process that has focused on the long-term viability of the community. In late 2004, the Town initiated a comprehensive strategic planning process that involved a significant amount of citizen input. A technical Advisory Committee consisting of citizens, volunteers and Town staff met to discuss the Town's long range vision for nearly a year. This citizen driven strategic planning process resulted in an expansive report entitled, "Town of Fountain Hills Strategic Plan 2006-2010" which was adopted on December 1, 2005. One of the major issues addressed in the report was the Town's projected future financial health. The report described a growing concern with the current reliance on construction sales tax base. Construction sales tax is considered a one-time revenue source which is driven entirely by development activity. As the Town approaches build-out construction related sales taxes and fees are likely to dwindle; with a declining revenue base it will become a challenge for the Town to meet the increasing demands of current service levels.

The Fountain Hills Town Council maintains a fund balance policy that ensures adequate reserves that will provide financial stability in the event of an unanticipated economic downturn. The policy was amended in fiscal year 2008-09 to include the establishment of a Rainy Day Fund beginning in fiscal year 2009-10 – a summary of the policy is below:

1. A contingency fund of no less than 30 days operating expenditures for the upcoming fiscal year to be designated for unanticipated expenditure or loss of revenue (Rainy Day Fund) separate from the General Fund
2. A designated unreserved fund balance of a minimum of ten percent (10%) of the average actual revenues for the preceding five fiscal years designated for "pay-as-you-go" capital
3. A reserved fund balance of twenty percent (20%) of the average actual revenues for the preceding five fiscal years which is unavailable for appropriation

These amounts will not be programmed for expenditure and are only available for use within the confines of expenditure limitations imposed by the State. A Capital Projects Fund has been created and is funded with proceeds from excess revenues collected over budget and any unexpended appropriations not needed to meet fund balance requirements or re-appropriation. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009 \$100,000 of surplus revenues were transferred from the General Fund to the Capital Projects Fund.

The Council also adopted financial policies that include guidelines for the issuance of debt for capital expenditures, Community Facility Districts, financing alternatives, expenditure controls and financial planning. The policy was amended during fiscal year 2006-07 to allocate a portion of the local construction sales tax to the Capital Projects Fund, thereby assuring that one time revenues are used for one time expenditures. The debt policy was prepared with a preference for “pay-as-you-go” financing for capital spending. An investment policy was adopted and was awarded the Investment Policy Certification from the Association of Public Treasurers of United States and Canada.

Major Initiatives. The Town of Fountain Hills’ adopted fiscal year 2009-10 budget reflects a downturn in the local economy, which is also mirrored at the national and state levels. In spite of the challenging current economic conditions, the Town was able to adopt a budget that did not require any service level reductions. This was accomplished by adhering to our adopted financial policies, a thorough reassessment of the base budget requests, and a thorough evaluation of all proposed additions to the budget.

AWARDS AND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Awards. The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) awarded a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting to the Town of Fountain Hills for its comprehensive annual financial report (CAFR) for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2008. This was the twelfth consecutive year that the government has received this prestigious award. In order to be awarded a Certificate of Achievement, the government published an easily readable and efficiently organized CAFR. This report satisfied both GAAP and applicable legal requirements.

A Certificate of Achievement is valid for a period of one year only. We believe that our current CAFR continues to meet the Certificate of Achievement Program’s requirements and we are submitting it to the GFOA to determine its eligibility for another certificate.

In addition, the government also received the GFOA’s Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for its annual budget for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009. In order to qualify for the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award, the government’s budget document was judged to be proficient in several categories, including as a policy document, a financial plan, an operations guide, and a communications device. This is the sixth consecutive year that the Town has received the award.

Acknowledgements. The preparation of this report would not have been possible without the efficient and dedicated services of the entire team of the Finance and Administration Department. I would also like to extend my appreciation to the Mayor and Council for their leadership and support. Each member of the department has my sincere appreciation for the contributions made in the preparation of this report.

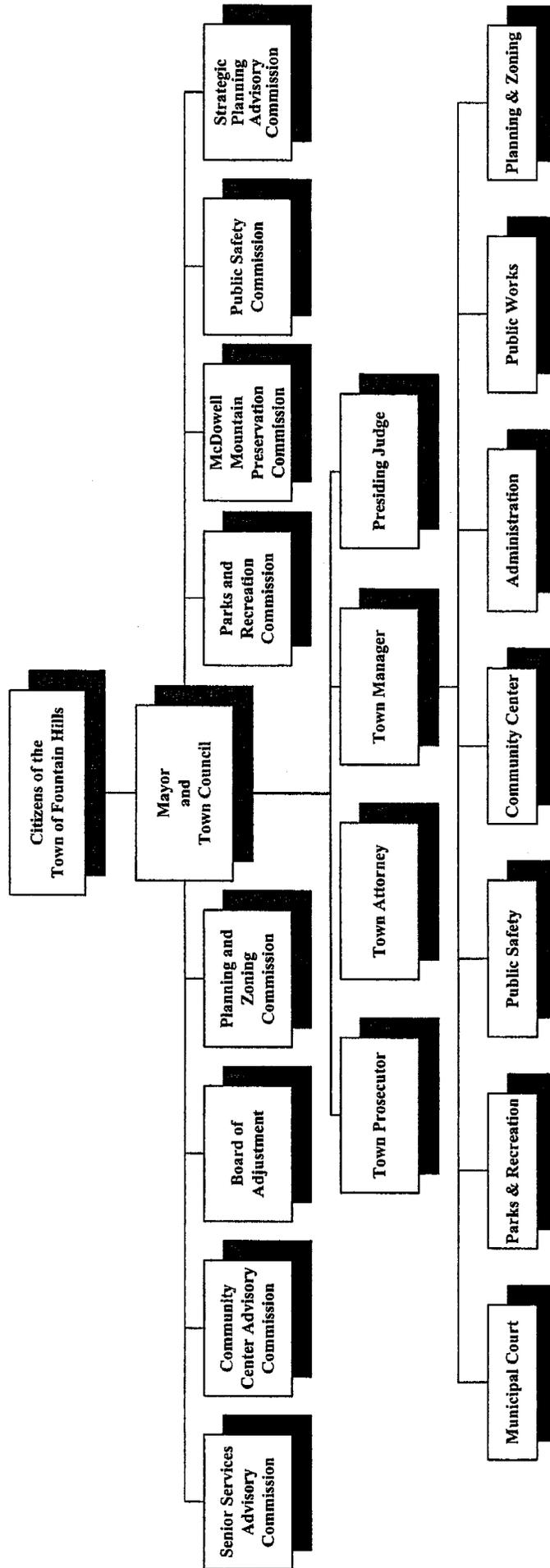

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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

The Honorable Mayor and Members of the Town Council
Town of Fountain Hills, Arizona

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Fountain Hills, Arizona (the Town), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2009, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and the significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Fountain Hills, Arizona as of June 30, 2009, and the respective changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated November 16, 2009, on our consideration of the Town of Fountain Hills, Arizona's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

The management's discussion and analysis on Pages 5 through 17 and budgetary comparison information on Pages 52 and 53 are not a required part of the basic financial statements but are supplementary information required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements. The accompanying supplementary information such as the introductory section, combining and individual fund financial statements and schedules, and statistical section are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund financial statements and schedules have been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The introductory and statistical sections have not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, accordingly, we express no opinion on them.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS (MD&A)
YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2009**

As management of the Town of Fountain Hills, Arizona (Town), we offer readers of the Town's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Town for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2009. This discussion and analysis is intended to be an easily readable breakdown of the Town of Fountain Hills' financial activities based on currently known facts, decisions and conditions. This analysis focuses on current year activities and operations and should be read in combination with the transmittal letter and the financial statements that follow. We encourage readers to consider the information presented here in conjunction with additional information that we have furnished in our letter of transmittal, which can be found in the introductory section of this report.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- The assets of the Town exceeded its liabilities at the close of fiscal year 2008-09 and fiscal year 2007-08 by \$120.5 million and \$121.0 million, respectively. Of these amounts, \$14.1 million and \$13.2 million, respectively, may be used to meet the government's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors.
- The Town's total net assets of governmental activities decreased \$455,268 (less than 1%) from the prior fiscal year as a result of the deferred investment in capital assets during the ongoing economic recession.
- General revenues accounted for \$19.8 million in revenue, or 87 percent of all current fiscal year revenues. Program specific revenues in the form of charges for services and grants and contributions accounted for \$2.8 million or 13 percent of total current fiscal year revenues.
- The Town had approximately \$23.1 million in expenses related to governmental activities, a decrease of 2 percent from the prior fiscal year. The decline can be attributed to the overall economic recession with the resultant budgetary cuts.
- Among major funds, the General Fund had \$14.9 million in current fiscal year revenues, which primarily consisted of local sales tax and State Shared revenues and \$14.1 million in expenditures. Per local policy residual General Fund revenues are transferred at year end to the Capital Projects Fund (\$100,000 for fiscal year 2008-09). Therefore, the General Fund balance remains steady at \$6.7 million.

OVERVIEW OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This discussion and analysis are intended to serve as an introduction to the Town's basic financial statements. The Town's basic financial statements comprise three components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements, and 3) notes to the financial statements. This report also contains other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves.

Government-wide financial statements. The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the Town's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business. The accrual basis of accounting is used for the government-wide financial statements.

The statement of net assets presents information on all of the Town's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as net assets. Over time, increases or decreases in net assets may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the Town is improving or deteriorating.

The statement of activities presents information showing how the Town's net assets changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net assets are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods (e.g., uncollected taxes and earned but unused compensated absences).

The government-wide financial statements outline functions of the Town that are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues. The governmental activities of the Town include general government, public safety, highways and streets, culture and recreation, community development, and interest on long-term debt.

Fund financial statements. A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The Town uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. All of the funds of the Town are included in the governmental funds.

Governmental funds. Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements, governmental fund financial statements use the modified accrual basis of accounting and focus on near-term inflows of spendable resources, as well as on balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating the Town's near-term financing requirements.

OVERVIEW OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Concl'd)

Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the Town's near-term financing decision. Both the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities.

Information is presented separately in the governmental fund balance sheet and in the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances for the General Fund, General Obligation Debt Service Fund, Municipal Property Corporation Debt Service Fund, and Capital Projects Fund, all of which are considered to be major funds. Data from the other governmental funds are combined into a single, aggregated presentation. Individual fund data for each of these non-major governmental funds is provided in the form of combining statements and schedules.

Notes to the financial statements. The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements. The notes to the financial statements can be found immediately following the basic financial statements.

Other information. In addition to the basic financial statements and accompanying notes, this report also presents certain required supplementary information concerning the Town's budget process. The Town adopts an annual expenditure budget for all governmental funds. A schedule of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances – budget and actual has been provided for the General Fund as required supplementary information.

GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

While this document contains information about the funds used by the Town to provide services to our citizens, the Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities serve to provide an answer to the question of how the Town, as a whole, did financially throughout the year. These statements include all assets and liabilities using the accrual basis of accounting similar to the accounting used by the private sector. The basis for this accounting takes into account all of the current year's revenues and expenses regardless of when the cash is received or paid.

These two statements report the Town's assets and the changes in those assets. The change in assets is important because it tells the reader whether the financial position of the Town as a whole has improved or diminished. However, in evaluating the overall position of the town, non-financial information such as changes in the Town's tax base and the condition of the town's capital assets will also need to be evaluated.

Analysis of Net Assets

Net assets may serve over time as a useful indicator of a government's financial position. In the case of the Town, assets exceeded liabilities by \$120.5 million at the current fiscal year end. The following table presents a summary of the Town's net assets for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2009 and June 30, 2008.

The largest portion of the Town's net assets (79 percent) reflects its investment in capital assets (e.g., land, infrastructure, buildings, improvements other than buildings, vehicles, machinery and equipment, and artwork) less any related debt used to acquire those assets that is still outstanding. The Town uses these capital assets to provide services to its citizens; consequently, these assets are not available for future spending. Although the Town's investment in its capital assets is reported net of related debt, it should be noted that the resources needed to repay this debt must be provided from other sources, since the capital assets themselves cannot be used to liquidate these liabilities. In addition, a portion of the Town's net assets (10 percent) are restricted by statute for the specified purposes of debt service repayment, capital outlay investment, and highways and streets.

At the end of the current fiscal year, the Town reported positive balances in all three categories of net assets. The same situation held true for the prior fiscal year.

The Town's financial position is the product of several financial transactions including the net results of activities, the acquisition and payment of debt, the acquisition and disposal of capital assets, and the depreciation of capital assets.

Analysis of Changes in Net Assets

The Town's total net assets decreased by \$455,268 during the current fiscal year as a result of delayed investment in capital assets due to the recession along with continued depreciation of existing assets. Future investments in capital assets will be possible as the economy recovers and funds are made available through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act.

The following are significant current year transactions that had an impact on the Statement of Net Assets.

- Accumulated depreciation increased by \$5.0 million
- Approximately \$850,000 less in outstanding receivables from the State and others
- Approximately \$656,000 decrease in year-end accounts payable
- \$1.2 million in park improvements

The Town's total revenues for the current fiscal year were \$22.6 million. The total cost of all programs and services was \$23.1 million. The following table presents a summary of the changes in net assets for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2009 and June 30, 2008.

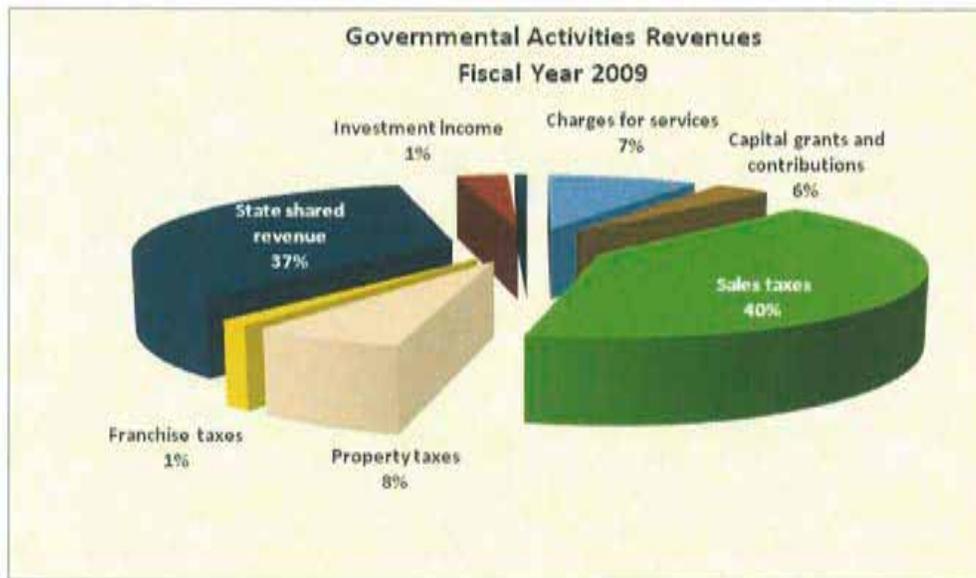

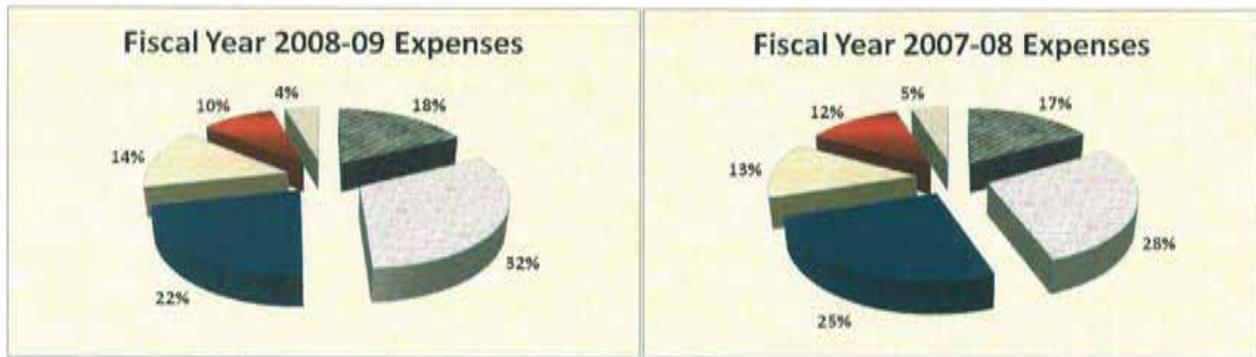

General revenues such as property, business, and privilege taxes are not shown by program, but are effectively used to support program activities town-wide. For governmental activities overall, without regard to program, business taxes which includes Sales and Use Taxes and Franchise Taxes, are the largest single source of funds (40%), followed by intergovernmental taxes (37%), property taxes (8%), charges for services (7%) and grants (6%)

The following are significant current year transactions that have had an impact on the change in net assets.

- Overall revenues decreased by 11% compared to last year as the economic recession resulted in less construction related revenues and sales tax; interest on investments also declined with lower rates of return
- Public Safety costs include contracts for police and fire; those contracts are multi-year with automatic increases
- Overall expenses decreased 2% as the Town cuts expenditures with available resources

The following table presents the cost of the six major Town functional activities: general government, public safety, highways and streets, culture and recreation, community development and interest on long-term debt. The table also shows each function's net cost (total cost less charges for services generated by the activities and intergovernmental aid provided for specific programs). The net cost shows the financial burden that was placed on the State and Town's taxpayers by each of these functions.

- The cost of all governmental activities this year was \$23.1 million.
- State government and charges for services subsidized certain programs with grants and contributions and other local revenues of \$2.8 million.
- Net cost of governmental activities of \$20.2 million was financed by general revenues, which are made up of primarily sales taxes of \$8.9 million and state shared revenue of \$8.5 million.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE TOWN'S FUNDS

As noted earlier, the Town uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

Governmental funds. The focus of the Town's governmental funds is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows, and balances of spendable resources. Such information is useful in assessing the Town's financing requirements. In particular, unreserved fund balance may serve as a useful measure of the Town's net resources available for spending at the end of the fiscal year.

The financial performance of the Town as a whole is reflected in its governmental funds. As the Town completed the year, its governmental funds reported a combined fund balance of \$22.5 million, a decrease of \$295,726 due primarily to decreased sales tax collections for Municipal Property Corporation debt service and the use of reserves for planned capital projects in the Capital Projects Fund.

The General Fund comprises 30 percent of the total fund balance. Approximately \$3.4 million or 51 percent of the General Fund's fund balance constitutes unreserved fund balance. The remaining fund balance is reserved to indicate that it is not available for spending because it has already been committed as follows:

- \$7,965 for prepaid items
- \$11,922 for inventory
- \$3,222,938 for other purposes

The General Fund is the principal operating fund of the Town; overall the General Fund's performance resulted in revenues over expenditures for fiscal year 2008-09 in an amount of \$805,154. The fund balance of \$6.7 million in the General Fund as of fiscal year end has remained constant over the past three years due to the annual transfer of residual revenues from the General Fund to the Capital Projects Fund (\$100,000 for fiscal year 2008-09). Expenditures within the General Fund decreased 7% over the prior year – the savings were partially realized with reductions in staff due to decreased workload, primarily in the building related services. Other cuts included reduced maintenance on public property, such as parks, and elimination of a stormwater prevention programs. As the recession continues General Fund revenues have declined 10% overall from the prior fiscal year particularly in State Sales and Vehicle Licenses taxes, building related revenue categories and interest earnings.

Other fund balance variances include Development Fees Fund that expended accumulated funds for capital park projects. Debt service fund balances have declined as sales and property tax revenues declined. HURF (Highway User Revenue Fund) expenditures exceeded current revenues due as projects that were carried forward to FY09 are completed, utilizing accumulated reserves.

BUDGETARY HIGHLIGHTS

A schedule showing the original and final budget amounts compared to the Town's actual financial activity for the General Fund is provided in this report as required supplementary information. The significant variances are summarized as follows:

- The unfavorable revenue variance of \$379,196 in intergovernmental revenues was a result of the State's projection of State sales and vehicle license taxes being more than actual collections which affects the distribution to cities and towns.
- The unfavorable revenue variance of \$577,134 in licenses and permits reflects the continued economic recession, particularly in construction related activities. Building permit revenues continue to decline and are down 52% from the prior fiscal year.
- The unfavorable revenue variance of \$222,859 in investment income was a result of decreasing rate of return on Town investments on deposit with the Arizona State Treasurers Local Government Investment Pool where the Town's idle funds are maintained in a pool of government securities.
- The favorable revenue variance of \$80,363 in fines and forfeiture reflects increased court activity related to traffic violations within Town borders.
- The favorable expenditure variance of \$725,794 includes all departments. With declining resources all departments and divisions reduced their budgets from the prior fiscal year by eliminating staff positions, decreased maintenance of parks, open space, facilities and deferred projects.

CAPITAL ASSETS AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Capital Assets. As of June 30, 2009, the Town had invested \$189.4 million in capital assets, including buildings, vehicles, computers, equipment, infrastructure and artwork. This amount represents a net increase prior to depreciation of \$2.5 million from the prior fiscal year, primarily due to major park improvements at two Town parks (Fountain Park and Desert Vista Neighborhood Park). Total depreciation expense for the current fiscal year was \$5.0 million.

Debt Administration. At year-end, the Town had \$22.8 million in long-term debt outstanding, \$2.2 million due within one year; this represents a net decrease of \$2.2 million. The chart below is a summary of the Town's outstanding debt as of year end:

The Town's general obligation bonds are subject to two limits; the Constitutional debt limit (total debt limit) on all general obligation bonds (up to 20 percent of the total secondary assessed valuation) and the statutory debt limit on general municipal purpose bonds (up to six percent of the total secondary assessed valuation). The current total debt limitation for the Town is \$170.5 million, which is more than the Town's outstanding general obligation debt.

ECONOMIC FACTORS

The Town continues to maintain strong reserves for unforeseen circumstances, whether of a financial nature or a natural (or other) disaster. The Town's reserves, in combination with our consistent adherence to adopted financial policies and management practices, proved big factors in the credit rating awarded to Fountain Hills by the major credit rating companies.

The housing market has cooled significantly (both nationally and regionally), indicating that the overall economy may continue to experience slow growth in the year ahead. The Town's local housing economy provides building permit and construction sales tax revenue, which have declined over the past three fiscal years. With a limited inventory of available lots the Town will have to adjust to the new economy, one that is less dependent upon building activity as a source of reliable revenue. There is an area of almost 1,300 acres that was annexed in 2006 that is planned to be developed but the first building permit is not scheduled to be pulled until 2015.

The Town's local sales tax collections, which represent the largest Town revenue source is made up of primarily construction, retail, telecommunications and restaurant bar activity. Construction related sales tax are projected to continue declining for the foreseeable future; retail collections, however, are projected to remain steady due to the fact that the existing retail base is not significantly affected by the recession (major retail activity consists of three grocery stores and one shopping center with a major retailer).

The Town is heavily dependent upon State Shared Revenues for General Fund operations (44%); State-shared income tax revenues are anticipated to decline significantly (25% or \$0.8M) in fiscal year 2010-11 due to a two year lag between actual individual and business revenues and State collections with a total General Fund decline of 6%. The Town is aggressively pursuing economic vitality and redevelopment opportunities, specifically a proposed development in the downtown center. The Town recently partnered with the Fountain Hills Chamber of Commerce to commission a vision for the downtown core including the world renowned fountain lake area. The plan was presented to the public late summer of 2009 and will be a useful tool for Economic Development to attract developers.

The Town continues to make significant quality of life investments including the major improvements to both Fountain Park and Desert Vista Neighborhood Park.

As of June 30, 2009 the Town had set aside \$10.4 million in the capital improvement fund but the majority of capital projects will be deferred until the economy improves. The Town has been successful in obtaining stimulus funding for a major road improvement along Shea Boulevard that is scheduled to begin construction in fiscal year 2009-10.

NEXT YEAR'S BUDGETS AND RATES

Current economic conditions will force the Town to evaluate core services and, in some cases, to reduce existing service levels. Prudent long-term fiscal planning dictates that we remain conservative, focus on the highest Council and citizen priorities, and fund only those enhancements we can sustain financially.

The fiscal year 2009-10 operating budget is \$22.6 million representing a 9.0% decrease from fiscal year 2007-08. The operating budget is comprised of the costs to continue operations from year to year without any capital expenditures. It encompasses all the basic services provided to Fountain Hills' residents: police and fire protection; parks, recreation, streets maintenance; planning and zoning; building inspection; economic development and administrative services. The capital budget is set at \$12.7 million, a 369% increase over fiscal year 2008-09. It includes projects that qualify for Federal stimulus funding under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) of 2009; qualified projects include widening of Shea Boulevard from two to three lanes. Shea Boulevard is a major thoroughfare that connects the east valley with Fountain Hills through Scottsdale. Also proposed for funding in fiscal year 2009-10 is a bond issue to resurface Saguaro Boulevard, one of three arterial roads into the community (\$4.5 million). There are some projects in the five-year plan that are considered affordable within current revenue sources, others will require other sources of revenue for funding such as bonds, grants, etc. Capital budgets tend to rise and fall each year depending on the timing of projects – especially if a Town, such as Fountain Hills, is primarily on a “pay-as-you-go” program.

The Capital Improvement Program (CIP) is the Town's financial plan for supporting large capital projects. The five-year CIP addresses the growing needs of the community and enhances the quality of life through major public investment, and is an essential ingredient in the Town's service delivery plan. The CIP is closely aligned with the General Plan, and integrates a number of specialized facility and infrastructure master plans. Looking ahead, the five-year CIP totals \$78.7 million; with the Capital Budget for fiscal year 2009-10 totaling \$12.7 million (which includes carryover funds for some large projects currently underway). In fiscal year 2009-10, the CIP places major emphasis on major road improvements and maintenance. Due to the economy there are no recreational or non essential projects proposed.

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements of the Town of Fountain Hills, Arizona (Town) have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as applied to government units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles.

The more significant of the Town's accounting policies are described below.

A. Reporting Entity

The Town is a municipal entity governed by an elected Mayor and council. As required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, these financial statements present the Town and its component units, entities for which the Town is considered to be financially accountable. Blended component units, although legally separate entities, are, in substance, part of the Town's operations and so data from these units are combined with data of the Town, the primary government.

The financial reporting entity consists of a primary government and its component units. A component unit is a legally separate entity that must be included in the reporting entity in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. The Town is a primary government that has a separately elected governing body, is legally separate, and is fiscally independent of other state or local governments. Furthermore, component units combined with the Town for financial statement presentation purposes and the Town are not included in any other governmental reporting entity. Consequently, the Town's financial statements include only the funds of those organizational entities for which its elected governing body is financially accountable.

The Eagle Mountain Community Facilities Town and the Cottonwoods Improvement Town. As special purpose districts and separate political subdivisions under the Arizona Constitution, the districts can levy taxes and issue bonds independently of the Town. Property owners in the designated areas are assessed for Town taxes, and thus for the costs of operating the districts. The Town Council serves as the Board of Directors; however, the Town has no liability for the districts' debt. For financial reporting purposes, transactions of the Towns are combined together and included as if they were part of the Town's operations.

The Town of Fountain Hills, Arizona Municipal Property Corporation's (MPC) Board of Directors consists of three members which are appointed by the Fountain Hills Town Council. The MPC, which is a nonprofit corporation incorporated under the laws of the State of Arizona, was formed for the sole purpose of assisting the Town in obtaining financing for various projects of the Town. The Town has a "moral obligation" for the repayment of the MPC's bonds. For financial reporting purposes, transactions of the MPC are combined together and included as if they were part of the Town's operations.

B. Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the statement of net assets and the statement of activities) present financial information about the Town as a whole. For the most part, the effect of internal activity has been removed from these statements. These statements are to distinguish between the governmental and business-type activities of the Town. Governmental activities normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues. The Town does not have any business-type activities.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. Program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes, state shared revenues, investment income and other items not included among program revenues are reported instead as general revenues.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds and proprietary funds. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

C. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statement Presentation

Government-wide Financial Statements – The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the grantor or provider have been met. As a general rule, the effect of internal activity has been eliminated from the government-wide financial statements; however, the effects of interfund services provided and used between functions are reported as expenses and program revenues at amounts approximating their external exchange value.

Fund Financial Statements – Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the Town considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period.

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont'd)

Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service resources are provided during the current year for payment of long-term debt principal and interest due early in the following year (not to exceed one month) and therefore the expenditures and related liabilities have been recognized. Compensated absences are recorded only when payment is due.

Property taxes, sales taxes, franchise taxes, licenses and permits, charges for services, special assessments and investment income associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. Grants and similar awards are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the grantor or provider have been met. Miscellaneous revenue is not susceptible to accrual because generally they are not measurable until received in cash. Grants and similar awards are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the grantor or provider have been met. Deferred revenues arise when resources are received by the Town before it has legal claim to them, as when grant monies are received prior to meeting all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider.

Delinquent property taxes have been recorded as deferred revenue. Receivables that will not be collected within the available period have also been reported as deferred revenue on the governmental fund financial statements.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the Town's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

The focus of governmental fund financial statements is on major funds rather than reporting funds by type. Each major fund is presented in a separate column. Non-major funds are aggregated and presented in a single column. The internal service fund is presented in a single column on the face of the proprietary fund statements.

The Town reports the following major governmental funds.

General Fund – This fund is the Town's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the Town, except those required to be accounted for in other funds.

General Obligation Debt Service Fund – This fund accounts for the Town's property tax revenues received to pay the debt service of the Town's general obligation bonds.

Municipal Property Corporation Debt Service Fund – This fund accounts for the revenues received to pay the debt service on MPC revenue bonds.

Capital Projects Fund – This fund accounts for the capital improvements to various projects of the Town.

Additionally, the Town reports the following und type:

Proprietary Fund – The Proprietary Fund is an Internal Service Fund that accounts for activities related to the Town’s vehicle replacement program and the operation of Town functions that provide goods and services to other Town departments on a cost reimbursement basis.

The Proprietary Fund financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and are presented in a single column.

Proprietary funds distinguish operating revenues and expenses from nonoperating items. Operating revenues and expenses generally result from providing services and producing and delivering goods in connection with a proprietary fund’s principal ongoing operations. The principal operating revenues of the Town’s internal service funds are charges for the vehicle replacement program and charges to Town departments for goods and services. Operating expenses for internal service funds include the cost of goods and services and administrative expenses. All revenues and expenses not meeting this definition are reported as nonoperating revenues and expenses

D. Cash and Investments

For the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, the Town considers all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents. Cash and cash equivalents at year end were cash in bank, cash with paying agent and cash held by the State Treasurer.

Nonparticipating interest-earning investment contracts are stated at cost. Money market investments and participating interest investment contracts with a remaining maturity of one year or less at time of purchase are stated at amortized cost. All other investments are stated at fair value.

E. Investment Income

Investment income is composed of interest, dividends and net changes in the fair value of applicable investments.

F. Receivables and Payables

Activity between funds that is representative of lending/borrowing arrangements outstanding at the end of the fiscal year is referred to as either “due to/from other funds” (i.e., the current portion of interfund loans) or “advances to/from other funds” (i.e., the non-current portion of interfund loans). All other outstanding balances between funds are reported as “due to/from other funds.”

All trade and property tax receivables are shown net of an allowance for uncollectibles.

Property taxes are levied by the Town and collected by the Maricopa County Treasurer. Property taxes are levied no later than the third Monday in August and are payable in two installments due October 1 of the current year and March 1 of the subsequent year. Taxes become delinquent after the first business day of November and May, respectively. Interest attaches on installments after the delinquency date.

Pursuant to A.R.S. a lien against assessed real and personal property attaches on the first day of January preceding assessment and levy; however according to case law, an enforceable legal claim to the asset does not arise.

The State Constitution and State law specify a property tax levy limitation system. The system consists of two levies, a limited levy known as the primary property tax levy and an unlimited levy referred to as the secondary levy, which may only be used to retire bonded indebtedness.

The primary tax levy is limited to an increase of 2 percent over the previous year's maximum allowable primary levy, plus an increased dollar amount because of a net gain in property not taxed the previous year. Also, the primary property tax from all taxing jurisdictions for homeowners may not exceed 1 percent of the market value of their homes. If the combined primary property tax (for the Town, County, School Town, etc.) exceeds 1 percent of the market value of the homes, the school districts will reduce their rate until the homeowners' aggregate rate is equal to or less than the allowable 1 percent. The State will then subsidize the school districts for the reduced revenue. This 1 percent limitation applies to primary property taxes only and does not affect the secondary property tax levy.

There is also a control on the assessed value of property for primary tax purposes. The base year for the new tax system is fiscal year 1978-79. From this base year, two assessed values evolve. The primary assessed values are allowed to increase by no more than 10 percent a year. The dollar amount of the secondary property tax levy is "unlimited" and the actual full cash value of property is used in determining the tax rate.

G. Inventory

Inventories are stated at average cost using the first-in/first-out (FIFO) method. Inventories consist of expendable supplies held for consumption. Inventories are recorded as expenses when consumed in the government-wide financial statements, and as expenditures when consumed on the fund financial statements.

H. Prepaid Items

Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items in both the government-wide and fund financial statements.

I. Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include land, artwork, buildings, improvements other than buildings, vehicles, machinery, and equipment, construction in progress, and infrastructure assets (e.g., roads, bridges, sidewalks, and similar items), are reported in the applicable governmental or business-type activities columns in the government-wide financial statements. Capital assets are defined by the Town as assets with an initial, individual cost of \$5,000 or more and an estimated useful life of more than one year. Such assets are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost if actual historical cost is not available. Donated capital assets are recorded at estimated fair market value at the date of donation.

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend the life of the asset are not capitalized. Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed.

Capital assets of the Town are depreciated using the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

J. Compensated Absences

The Town's employee vacation and sick leave policies generally provide for granting vacation and sick leave with pay. Sick leave and vacation benefits vest after 30 days at the employee's current rate of pay.

The current and long-term liabilities, including related benefits, for accumulated vacation and sick leave are reported on the government-wide financial statements. A liability for these amounts is reported in governmental funds only if they have matured, for example, as a result of employee leave, resignations and retirements. Generally, resources from the General Fund are used to pay for compensated absences.

K. Long-term Obligations

In the government-wide financial statements, and proprietary fund types in the fund financial statements, long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities on the statement of net assets. Bond premiums and discounts, as well as issuance costs and the difference between the reacquisition price and the net carrying amount of the old debt, are deferred and amortized over the life of the bonds using the straight-line method over the term of the related debt.

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Concl'd)

In the fund financial statements, governmental fund types recognize bond premiums and discounts, as well as bond issuance costs, during the current period. The face amount of debt issued is reported as other financing sources. Premiums received on debt issuances are reported as other financing sources while discounts of debt issuances are reported as other financing uses. Issuance costs, whether or not withheld from the actual debt proceeds received, are reported as debt service expenditures.

L. Fund Equity

In the fund financial statements, governmental funds report reservations of fund balance for amounts that are not available for expenditures or are legally restricted by outside parties for use for a specific purpose. Designations of fund balance represent tentative management plans that are subject to change.

M. Interfund Activity

Flows of cash from one fund to another without a requirement for repayment are reported as interfund transfers. Interfund transfers between governmental funds are eliminated in the Statement of Activities. Interfund transfers in the fund statements are reported as other financing sources/uses in governmental funds and after non-operating revenues/expenses in proprietary funds.

N. Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

NOTE 3 – CASH AND INVESTMENTS

A.R.S. authorize the Town to invest public monies in the State Treasurer’s local government investment pools, obligations of the U.S. Government and its agencies, obligations of the State and certain local government subdivisions, interest-bearing savings accounts and certificates of deposit, collateralized repurchase agreements, certain obligations of U.S. corporations, and certain other securities. The statutes do not include any requirements for credit risk, custodial credit risk, concentration of credit risk, interest rate risk, or foreign currency risk for the Town’s investments.

Custodial Credit Risk – Deposits. Custodial Credit risk is the risk that in the event of bank failure the Town’s deposits may not be returned to the Town. The Town does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk. At year end, the carrying amount of the Town’s deposits was \$1,735,299 and the bank balance was \$840,484. At year end, the Town’s deposits were entirely covered by Federal depository insurance.

The State Treasurer’s pools are external investment pools, the Local Government Investment Pool (Pool 5) and Local Government Investment Pool-Government (Pool 7), with no regulatory oversight. The pools are not required to register (and are not registered) with the Securities and Exchange Commission. The activity and performance of the pools are reviewed monthly by the State Board of Investments. The fair value of each participant’s position in the State Treasurer investment pools approximates the value of the participant’s shares in the pool and the participant’s shares are not identified with specific investments.

Interest Rate Risk. The Town does not have a formal investment policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates.

Credit Risk. The Town has no investment policy that would further limit its investment choices. As of year end, for investments in the State Treasurer's investment pool 5, 77% of the securities were rated AAA, A+, or A1; all of the remaining securities were rated A- or better by Standard and Poor's.

Custodial Credit Risk – Investments. The Town's investment in the State Treasurer's investment pool represents a proportionate interest in the pool's portfolio; however the Town's portion is not identified with specific investments and is not subject to custodial credit risk.

Concentration of Credit Risk. The Town places no limit on the amount the Town may invest in any one issuer.

NOTE 6 – BONDS PAYABLE

Bonds payable at year end, consisted of the following general obligation, municipal property corporation and community facilities district bonds. The bonds are both callable and noncallable with the interest payable semiannually. Property taxes from the General Obligation Bond Debt Service Fund and Eagle Mountain Debt Service Fund are used to pay general obligation and community facilities district bonds. State shared revenues from the HURF Fund are used to pay street and highway user bonds. Tax revenues from the General Fund and Excise Tax Fund are used to pay municipal facilities bonds.

NOTE 6 – BONDS PAYABLE (Concl'd)

The Town has pledged future excise taxes to repay a total of \$10,790,000 in outstanding municipal facilities revenue and refunding bonds. For fiscal year ended June 30, 2009, the net revenues available to service this debt were \$8.2 million. The debt principal and interest paid on this debt in fiscal year 2008-09 was \$805,000 and \$452,486, respectively (15% of available pledged revenues).

Per local policy, residual General Fund revenues are transferred at year end to the Capital Projects Fund (\$100,000 for fiscal year 2008-09). Only restrictions imposed by external sources are shown as Restricted Net Assets on the government-wide financial statements. Additionally, reserves for other purposes, inventory and prepaid items are shown on the governmental fund financial statements. Reservations or designations of fund balances imposed by the reporting government, whether by administrative policy or legislative action of the reporting government, are shown in aggregate on the governmental fund financial statements, but not on the proprietary fund financial statements.

NOTE 10 – CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

Lawsuits – The Town is a defendant in various lawsuits. Although the outcome of these lawsuits is not presently determinable, in the opinion of the Town's legal counsel, the resolution of these matters will not have a material adverse effect on the financial condition of the Town.

NOTE 11 – RISK MANAGEMENT

The Town is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; and natural disasters. The Town's insurance protection is provided by the Arizona Municipal Risk Retention Pool, of which the Town is a participating member. The limit for basic coverage is for \$2,000,000 per occurrence on a claims made basis. Excess coverage is for an additional \$13,000,000 per occurrence on a follow form, claims made basis. No significant reduction in insurance coverage occurred during the year, and no settlements exceeded insurance coverage during any of the past three fiscal years.

The Town was unable to obtain worker's compensation insurance at a cost considered to be economically justifiable. Therefore the Town joined the Arizona Municipal Workers' Compensation Pool (AMWCP). AMWCP is a public entity risk pool currently operating as a common worker's compensation insurance program for 67 member cities and towns. The Town is responsible for paying a premium, based on an experience rating formula that allocates pool expenditures and liabilities among members.

NOTE 12 – RETIREMENT PLANS

Defined Contribution Pension Plan – All full-time employees of the Town participate in a defined contribution pension plan administered by the ICMA Retirement Corporation as a 401(a) plan. The payroll for the Town employees covered by this plan for the year ended June 30, 2009 was \$3,415,797. The Town's total payroll was \$4,149,335.

NOTE 12 – RETIREMENT PLANS (Concl'd)

A defined contribution pension plan provides benefits in return for services rendered, provides an individual account for each participant, and specifies how contributions to the individual's account are to be determined, instead of specifying the amount of benefit the individual is to receive. Under a defined contribution pension plan, the benefits a participant will receive depend solely on the amount contributed to the participant's account, the returns earned on investment of those contributions, and forfeitures of other participants' benefits that may be allocated to such participant's account. All non-peace officer full-time Town employees must participate in the pension plan from the date they are hired. Contributions made by an employee vest immediately and contributions made by the Town vest after three years of service.

An employee that leaves the employment of the Town is entitled to his or her contributions and the vested portion of the Town's contributions, plus interest earned. Each employee must contribute 11 percent of his or her gross earnings. The Town must contribute 11 percent of covered earnings. During fiscal year 2008-09, the Town's required and actual contributions amounted to \$375,414. The employees' contributions totaled \$526,416. Employees may also contribute to the ICMA Retirement Corporation 457 plan on a voluntary basis; there is no employee match for those contributions. During fiscal year 2008-09, employees contributed \$151,002 to that plan.

No pension provision changes occurred during the year that affected the required contributions to be made by the Town or its employees.

The ICMA Retirement Corporation held no securities of the Town or other related parties during the fiscal year 2008-09 or as of the close of the fiscal year.

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NON-MAJOR SPECIAL REVENUE FUNDS

Special Revenue funds are used to account for proceeds of specific revenues sources that are legally restricted to expenditures for specific purposes (other than major capital projects). The funds are usually required by statute, ordinance, or federal grant regulation to finance specified activities of the Town. The Town maintains the following non-major Special Revenue funds.

HURF Fund - accounts for the Town's share of motor fuel tax revenues and lottery proceeds.

Development Fees Fund - accounts for development fees collected from developers restricted for projects approved by the Town Council.

Local Court Enhancement Fund - accounts for activities of grants from the Arizona Supreme Court.

Grants Fund - accounts for the activities of various grants and contributions received by the Town.

Excise Tax Fund - accounts for the portion of Town sales tax reserved by the Town Council for special projects including Town beautification and economic development.

Public Art Fund - accounts for the one percent surcharge on commercial and multi-family development dedicated to purchasing art.

Operating Information

These schedules contain information about the Town's operations and various resources to help the reader draw conclusions as to how the Town's financial information relates to the services provided by the Town.

This information will be accumulated and reported each year until the complete ten years of data is presented.
